


Discovery Enquiry – Raiders, Traders or Invaders?

Sticky Knowledge

- 55 BC: First Raid. Julius Caesar raided Britain for the first time but the Celts fought back and Caesar retreated to France.
- 54 BC: Second Raid. Julius Caesar tried again. This time he had some success but it didn't last for long.
- 43 AD: Final Raid. Emperor Claudius started a successful invasion and the Celts realised how powerful the Romans were and agreed to obey Roman law and pay taxes.
- AD 60: Queen Boudicca started a rebellion against the Roman army. Thousands of people died but the Romans eventually won.
- Romans were famous for building long straight roads.
- Romans built Roman baths where people could go to relax. Some of these buildings remain today.




- There are three types of naturally occurring rock. They are Igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic.




The growth of the Roman Empire

Vital Vocabulary

The Roman Empire	The name for the land that was controlled by the Romans, including parts of Europe, Africa and the Middle East.
Invade	To enter and occupy land.
Legion	A large section of the Roman army, made up of 5000 soldiers.
Celts	People living in Britain.
Emperor	The ruler of an empire.
Iceni	A tribe of Celts who lived in the east of Britain.
Caledonia	A name used in Roman times for Scotland.
Picts	Tribes from Caledonia.
Kingdom	An area ruled by a king.
Raid	A surprise attack.
Igneous rock	Rock that has been formed from magma or lava.
Sedimentary rock	Rock that has been formed by layers of sediment being pressed down hard and sticking together. You can see the layers of sediment in sedimentary rock.
Metamorphic rock	Rock that started out as igneous or sedimentary rock but has changed due to being exposed to extreme heat or pressure.
Vertebrate	Animals with backbones.
Invertebrates	Animals without backbones.
Muscles	Soft tissues in the body that relax and contract to cause movement.
Tendons	Cords that join muscles to bones.
Joints	Areas where two or more bones are fitted together.
Endoskeleton	A skeleton on the inside of the body that supports and protects it.
Exoskeleton	A skeleton on the outside of the body that supports and protects it.
